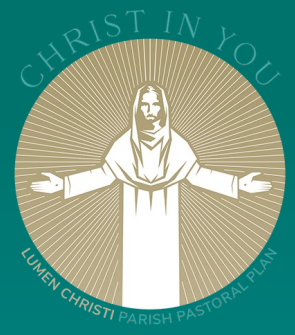

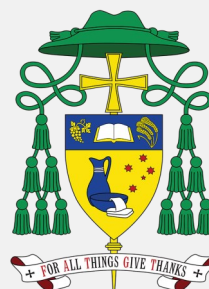

WORLD REFUGEES & MIGRATION SUNDAY

The Church has been celebrating the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR) since 1914. It is always an occasion to express concern for different vulnerable people on the move; to pray for them as they face many challenges; and to increase awareness about the opportunities that migration offers.

Pope Francis has chosen the title **"Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay"** as the theme for this year. He highlights a reflection on the right to remain in one's own land and not have to migrate:

"The flight of the Holy Family into Egypt was not the result of a free choice, just as many of the migrations that marked the history of the people of Israel were not. Migrating should always be a free choice, but in fact in many cases, even today, it is not. Conflicts, natural disasters, or more simply the impossibility of living a dignified and prosperous life in one's homeland force millions of people to leave."

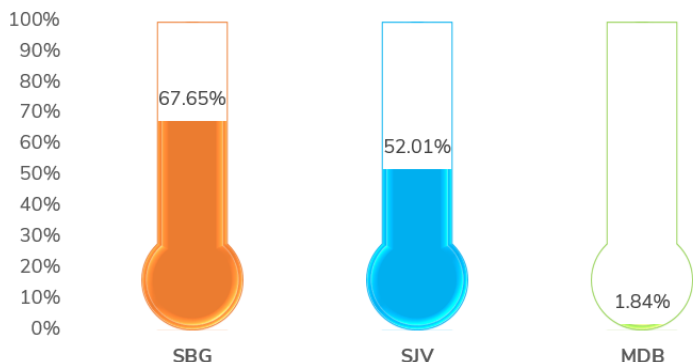

HELLO FROM DUBLIN!

Apart from my visits to Trinity College Dublin, where the Book of Kells is housed and revered, one of the many joys of living in Dublin is to visit the exhibitions of famous Irish people.

Two current exhibitions in Dublin celebrate Irish poets who received the Noble Prize in Literature: W.B. Yeats (1865-1939) and Seamus Heaney (1939-2013). Yeats is famous for many poems, among them **Easter, 1916**, which speaks of "A terrible beauty is born" from the Irish rebels dying for the freedom of the Irish nation.

Heaney's poetry is also attentive to the travails of the world around him. He reflects on the impact of the Troubles in Northern Ireland in the second half of the 20th century and expresses hope that the Peace process will succeed:

"History says, Don't hope
On this side of the grave,
But then, once in a lifetime
The longed-for tidal wave
Of justice can rise up,
And hope and history rhyme."

But there was a previous double trauma in Ireland's history—the Great Famine of 1845-1849. Scholars estimate that when the potato blight hit the poorest in Ireland and there was insufficient help from the Westminster government of the time, approximately 1 million people died and 1.5 million people emigrated to countries such as the United States. It was that devastating catastrophe that caused the lasting bitterness and resolve that Ireland should be self-governing.

The accounts of those who died are heartrending. The people who were starving did not have the chance for a dignified life and many who emigrated may not have had a truly free choice about staying or leaving. Many died on ships to faraway places such as Canada and New York.

Pope Francis' Message for World Refugees and Migration Sunday 2023 reflects upon the right people have to live in their land with dignity and not be forced to emigrate. He calls for a culture of welcome, protection and integration for those who have sought a better life in another country. He prays that we will be granted the courage to denounce the horrors and injustices that mar the beauty of God's children.

May it be so for us.

Gospel

Matthew 20:1-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a land-owner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the land-owner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

No Salvation outside the Church?

This is a story of the day labourers of Jesus' time. The 'early birds' contracted for the just wage of one denarius and did the hard work over the course of a long day. They were outraged when latecomers also received a denarius.

This little parable circulated in the Christian community of the first century because there was great antagonism between the Jews who became followers of Jesus and the non-Jews, the 'Gentiles'. Jewish Christians looked at their long history of hardship preparing for the coming of the Messiah. And, now, here were these Gentiles who had done nothing by comparison, and God appeared to be granting them whatever it took to enjoy the 'daily bread' of the Kingdom of God.

Jewish Christians had to be shocked out of their idea that God's grace could not be lavished on those outside the boundaries of the Chosen People.

We could pause to pray to be taken by happy surprise by those billions of people outside the Church who, by the grace of God, will share with us 'the Bread of Life', given for the salvation of all the world.

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
